Welcome to the third issue of our DUNC newsletter. Work really has started in earnest now. Our successful meeting last month in Karlskrona has helped lay solid project foundations and has seen the initiation of our first big all partner task, the baseline study in Work Package 3. Fantastic!

PROJECT NEWS

3- Day partner meeting in Karlskrona

30th Jan - 01 Feb: The meeting focused on mapping out the vision for our cross-border cooperation between UNESCO world heritage sites in the South Baltic region. Work on an extensive baseline study was initiated which involves the worldwide collection of tourism data from all coastal and hinterland UNESCO sites. This is a mammoth task being led by EUCC Baltic Office. The partners discussed the survey methodology and how information will be used to monitor and assess sustainable tourism developments at the Baltic Sea sites and how best practice examples will be used as building blocks for strategies/action plans that will manage tourist flows better. Addressing seasonality at UNESCO World Heritage sites is a high priority for the partnership and great progress was made during the meeting's workshops to define the role that local entrepreneurs play and the criteria for sustainable products and services. We came to a mutual understanding regarding the main goals of the project, and how to prioritize. We also came to a consensus regarding adjustments to some of the goals, particularly an understanding about our role in creating strategies for sustainable tourism for the long-term management plans for the

MONTHLY UPDATES

Karlskrona

The work during the last month, after our conference in Karlskrona, has mainly focused on WP1, the management of the project as a whole. I've formulated the changes we want to see in the goals and activities of the project. We are still aiming to make a real change and create a more sustainable future for our sites, with goals that are still ambitious but realistic.

I have also been working quite a lot with the request from Malbork to become an Associated Partner of the project, and the consequences of that request. Although this is still an ongoing issue, it looks like we will be able to solve this in a way that will actually strengthen the partnership and the project.

For me it has been important to get some more structure and organized planning in place, and therefore create a timeline for all activities in 2018 in the form of a Gantt chart for all partners. Please feel free to send me any additional activities that you want to see in that joint overview.

In Work Package 4 the progress is slow but steady. Last week I did send out a public procurement request to five consultants regarding the baseline study about the development of sustainable products and services, based on our workshop at the partner conference last month. Next week we will hopefully have some propositions from the consultants to review, and then decide who will do this study over the next three months. In the days ahead, I will be working on the budget changes connected to the goal changes, and also continue with the work related to Malborks' role.
